Texts, Translations & Tidbits

Oseh Shalom

TRANSLATION from HEBREW: Maker of peace in the heights, may you bring down peace among us and to all Israel and all people of the earth, and let us say: Amen.

Composer/arranger, Karen Siegel (New Jersey, U.S. b. 1980), wrote this piece soon after the most recent outbreak of fighting in Israel and Gaza. She writes: "Oseh Shalom is recited many times in each Jewish Shabbat service, including in the prayers for those in mourning. When there are no words, there is song."

Da Pacem

TRANSLATION from LATIN: Give peace, O Lord, in our days. Amen.

Composer, Jeff Enns (Ontario, Canada - b. 1972), has written this simple and serene setting with a nod to traditional Gregorian chant.

Mendelssohn's Prayer for Peace

TRANSLATION from GERMAN: Graciously grant us peace, Lord God, during our lifetimes. There is indeed no other who would contend for us than you, our God, alone. TRANSLATION from LATIN: Grant us peace

Composer, Felix Mendelssohn (Germany, 1809-1847), was a child prodigy and studied the music of J.S. Bach. This piece was first written for woodwinds, strings, organ and 4-part chorus. Arranger, Kirk Aamot (U.S. b. 1970), has set this beautiful piece for treble voices where the melody shines with hope.

Instrument of Peace

Text by Francis of Assisi (Italy, 1181-1226):

Where there is hatred, let me bring love. Where there is darkness, let me bring light. Where there is sadness, let me bring joy; Make me an instrument of peace.

Where there's uncertainty, let me bring faith. Where there is injury, let me forgive. Where there is hopelessness, let me bring hope. Make me an instrument of peace.

Grant that I may not so much seek to be consoled as to console, to be understood as to understand, and to be loved, but to love. It is in giving that we receive. And through forgiveness we find relief. It is in loving that we find love.

Make me an instrument of peace.

These words were paraphrased and set to music by composer, Kelly-Marie Murphy (Ottawa, Canada – b. 1964). A small group of nine singers was chosen for this concert to convey the simplicity and beauty of this arrangement.

The Golden Rule

Unique and joyful, this arrangement is written in an Afro-Cuban style with the piano playing a 16-bar vamp called montuno while the bass provides a tumbao in the same 16-bar format. The montuno/tumbao used here is by Carlos Campos to which the composer, Wayland Rogers (Chicago, IL -1941-2020), has added the vocal parts and text. The text is taken from eight variations of "The Golden Rule" found in many cultures and world religions.

Undivided

This powerful text and beautiful musical setting is written by composer, Karen Marrolli (New Mexico, U.S. - b. 1975), and speaks to the desire for people of different backgrounds and ideologies to come together in unity for the common good.

When darkness drops an anchor in the fearful oceans of our minds, and when the world is preaching rancor, I can choose to be kind. And maybe more will find the quiet rivers, where we'll lift a peaceful melody, and undivided we will stand, stand together, hand in hand.

And when hatred shatters silence, and each one clings to each one's will, and when the world bows down to violence, I can refuse to kill. And maybe more will join in sweet resistance, singing chords in gentle harmony, and undivided we will stand, stand together, hand in hand.

And when anger breeds division, we can choose to stand side by side, and when the world exalts derision, we can choose to lift each other high. And maybe then we'll join in one big chorus, singing songs of peace and unity, and undivided we will stand, stand together, hand in hand.

The Times They Are A-Changin'

One of the most famous and widely sung songs of the 1960's has been reharmonized and reenvisioned by musician/composer, Adam Podd (Brooklyn, N.Y. - b. 1986). Songwriter, Bob Dylan (b. 1941, Duluth, MN) wrote this song in the fall of 1963 and it quickly became a timeless protest anthem.

Come gather 'round people wherever you roam and admit that the waters around you have grown, and accept it that soon you'll be drenched to the bone. If your time to you is worth savin', and you better start swimmin' or you'll sink like a stone, for the times, they are a-changin'.

Come mothers and fathers throughout the land and don't criticize what you can't understand. Your sons and your daughters are beyond your command. Your old road is rapidly aging. Please get out of the new one if you can't lend a hand. For the times, they are a-changin'.

The line it is drawn, the curse it is cast. The slow one now will later be fast. As the present now will later be past, the order is rapidly fading. And the first one now will later be last. For the times, they are a-changin'.

I Will Be a Child of Peace

Composer Elaine Hagenberg (Des Moines, IA - b. 1979), has arranged the Shaker Hymn tune, *O Holy Father*, which is attributed to Alonzo Gilman of the Shaker Community in 1851. The composer writes that she was "drawn to the song by the beautiful simplicity of the Shaker melody, unique 5/4 meter and, most importantly, the uplifting text of a prayer for peace and purity."

O, Holy Father, I will be a child of peace and purity, for well I know Thy hand will bless the seeker after righteousness.

Dona Nobis Pacem

This familiar canon attributed to both composers Giovanni Palestrina (16th c.) as well as Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart (18th c.), is usually labeled as "Traditional" as there is no proof of compositional origin. The Latin text translates as "Grant Us Peace." Minnesotan composer, Marty Haugen (b. 1950) has written additional verses and instrumental parts. The soloist for this song is Emma Carpenter, age 11, from Bloomington. Emma sings with Angelica Cantanti Youth Choirs in Bloomington where Michelle Gehrz is her director.

Imagine

John Lennon (1940-1980) wrote this song in 1971 along with his wife, Yoko Ono.
